

## VIGI by TP-Link Statement on National Defense Authorization Act

## Dear VIGI Customers,

On August 13, 2018, the United States government passed the John S. McCain National Defense Authorization Act for the 2019 fiscal year, commonly known as NDAA 2019. This legislation is responsible for outlining the budget, expenditures, and policies of the United States Department of Defense. Among its provisions, Section 889 specifically prohibits the U.S. government from:

- 1. Procuring certain technologies from certain Chinese companies and their subsidiaries;
- 2. Contracting with companies that use these technologies in an essential and vulnerable system of their products or business operations.

As a reliable video surveillance provider, we follow legal and socially responsible business practices. We continue creating stable, reliable, high-quality products and services for our customers and clients.

We comply with NDAA regulations and guarantee our products meet stringent standards and project requirements.

We, (TP-Link Systems Inc.), hereby declare that the production and sales process of our products are in compliance with local laws and regulations worldwide. This declaration includes, without limitation, all of our products complying with Section 889 of the Fiscal Year 2019 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA):

- The products do not use, contain, or comprise any Covered Telecommunications Equipment or Services as substantial or essential components of any system or as critical technology as part of any system defined by Section 889 of the NDAA.
- We do not use any Covered Telecommunications Equipment or Services as substantial or
  essential components of any system or critical technology as part of any system defined by
  Section 889 of the NDAA.

## \*\*Under the NDAA Act (in summary):

**Covered Telecommunications Equipment** is defined as video surveillance and telecommunications equipment produced or supplied by Identified Chinese Suppliers.

## Identified Chinese Suppliers are:

- 1. Huawei Technologies Company;
- 2. ZTE Corporation;
- 3. HyteraCommunications Corporation;
- 4. Hangzhou Hikvision Digital Technology Company; or
- 5. Dahua Technology Company; and
- 6. Any of the subsidiaries or affiliates of these entities; or



7. Any other entity that the Secretary of Defense, in consultation with the Director of National Intelligence or the Director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, reasonably believes to be an entity owned or controlled by, or otherwise connected to, the government of the People's Republic of China.
